The Rotary Club of Volcano is hosting a free community event this month that can shed some light on these and other aspects of International Humanitarian Law. "Even War has Rules" is a talk prepared and presented by the American Red Cross. It will be held at 8:30 a.m. Nov.2 at the Volcano Art Center.


This one-hour overview introduces fundamental principles that can clarify the rules governing conflicts around the world. The presenter, Marc Bender, is an international development specialist who has served in the U.S. State Department, the United Nations, the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe, and non-governmental organizations. His three decades in war zones and post-conflict environments—including Cambodia, Laos, Bosnia, Kosovo, Sudan, Somalia, Iraq, and Afghanistan—give him first- hand insights on many of these issues.

Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park Hawai'i Volcanoes Institute Presents

SUNDAY WALK IN THE PARK – KEANAKĀKO'I Sunday, October 8, 2023 - 10:00 am to 12:00 pm

This monthly program on second Sundays is aimed at bringing together the members of the Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park to explore the park's beautiful trails.

Join us for an exploration of Keanakāko'i crater. Walk through native forest and take in the breathtaking views. Keanakāko'i, meaning "cave of the adzes", likely formed during the 1400s, during Kīlauea's great summit collapses. Until 1877, Hawaiian kahuna kāko'i (carving experts) sought the crater's superior and rare basaltic rock for making ko'i, or adze heads. Bound to a sturdy 'au ko'i (wooden handle), this valuable tool was used to carve vital objects like canoes and houses. But the famous adze quarry was covered by lava, first in 1877, then again during the fissure eruption in July 1974. Today, the crater floor is 115 feet deep.

Walking distance from Devastation Trail parking area is 1.0 mile (1.6 km) each way.

This event is presented by the Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. Program cost is \$5.00 for Friends members. Non-members are welcome to join the Friends in order to attend. And, of course, additional donations are always accepted. Park entrance fees apply.

HAWAI'I COUNTY UPDATE

Over a recent evening on August 24th at the Cooper Center, the residents of Volcano had an opportunity to hear from a range of County Department heads, as well as Mayor Mitch Roth at a Town Hall event entitled, "Sustainable Horizons: Mayor Roth's Community Impact Check-In."

What follows is Volcano Community Association board member Scott Fossel's summary of what was covered in the meeting, to serve as an update for the Volcano community and as a starting point for further citizen action and community engagement. So if you read anything here that is of concern to you, would like to voice a complaint, or to share your support for an issue—make a call or send an email!

Mayor Mitch Roth [CALL: 808-961-8211 EMAIL: none provided]

The core of the Mayor's approach to governance is focused on enabling our kids to raise their kids in Hawaii. His policy priorities extend directly from this underlying goal, chief among them affordable housing, good employment opportunities particularly in the growing STEM fields, and reducing cost of living particularly through renewable energy independence and other avenues.

A department now on the move due to a 10X increase in its maintenance budget from just \$450K to over \$4M, Parks & Rec has some exciting news for the Volcano community. Though long overdue, the final materials required to re-open the Volcano skatepark are now

in County procurement, so look for calls in the months ahead to volunteers to help out. Longer term, through the initiative of the VCA and in keeping with the 1974, 1981 and 1994 master plans for Volcano Park, Parks & Rec has now agreed to planning funds for a new Volcano Park master plan in its 2025 budget. The planning process will likely involve a community planning firm and multiple forums for the Volcano community to express its priorities.

Recent points of progress include 32 miles of County roads repaved in 2022, by far the most in a decade or more, as well as the reduction in wait times for the EPIC building permit system from 200 down to 30 days, and greatly reduced pesticide use. Volcano residents were most concerned about preventing unlawful pin-to-pin clearing of native forest in the

Volcano Area, future sidewalks near Volcano School, covered bus shelters, and property tax reductions for seniors. Current unlawful pin-to-pin can be reigned in by an active response from the community, so call or use the complaint form when you see destructive practices. Longer term, the VCA will be actively involved with the final draft of the County's General Plan, seeking to build substantial forest protections into both the new Plan as well as the upcoming County Code rewrite.

Not long ago there were only approximately 1,000 affordable housing units in the pipeline to come online in coming years. Progress has been made rapidly recently however, and there are now 6,500 affordable housing units in the same pipeline, which at least approaches the goal of 10,000 units by 2025. The County has been investing over \$90 million in HUD funds from the Federal Government in both managing its significant homelessness problem and in accelerating affordable housing through contracts with non-profit groups and developers.

Planning is currently immersed in a comprehensive review and rewrite of the County's General Plan, which sets out the overall direction the County wants to go to optimize quality of life for all residents. Initiated in 2015, the process is now at a critical juncture, as the Draft General Plan will be released and open to community feedback by October. Look for an upcoming in-person event Saturday, Oct 7th 1:30-3:30pm at Auntie Sally's Luau Hale, as well as online workshops on both October 10th and 18th from 5-7pm. VCA and/or CCC will also request a "roadshow" presentation of the GP at the Cooper Center.

Current efforts center around preparing an Island-wide cesspool conversion plan to meet EPA standards. Unfortunately, there is no current plan for HI5 and glass recycling to return to Volcano, despite available budget for this service, due to there being no outside contractors who have bid for the work.

The County is in the process of transitioning animal control from a vendor contracted service to a new County Department and increasing services and providing new infrastructure to the most southern areas of the Island.

The department's greatest challenge is being understaffed, despite budget and training although both the budget and

training are available to bring on many more officers. Despite this understaffing, however, residents of Hawaii County are fortunate that they have lower crime rates on nearly every statistic than the average county on the Mainland.

The essential factor for emergency safety Island-wide is a critical mass of Hawaii residents being signed up for Civil Defense's alert systems. Available across a wide range of platforms, including most importantly their alerts through the Everbridge app and their live Hazard Impact Map, if you are not receiving alerts take action today. Volcano residents were most concerned with having a second route out of the Golf Course neighborhood in the event of an emergency and support for adding standpipes to water tanks for fire trucks to connect to in the event of fire—so if you support these concerns, get your voices heard.

KUAHIWI RANCH BEEF

Ka'ohi Mokuhali'i brings wonderful beef to Volcano's Sunday market from 6:30-9. They are located on the lower level by the entrance. The family run business is operated by 3 generations of the Galimba family. Begun in 1993, they operate on 9,000 acres between Wood Valley and Waiohinu. This pasture land between sealevel and 2100' is some of the finest in the State.

All of their beef is locally grown without antibiotics or hormones, range-free, on grass pastures, and processed in Pa'auillo with 3rd party certified humane practices.

You can find the price list at kuahiwiranch.com. Kuahiwi Ranch beef has won awards and is featured in Whole Foods Stores. Ground beef is \$6/lb and sirloin \$9/lb. You can also go to their ranch HQ in Na'alehu where the family sells their beef and ranch supplies.

Their beef is served at the Volcano House Restaurant and the Eagle's Lighthouse Café. VCA is thankful to have Kuahiwi Ranch serving our community and we hope you will patronize them regularly.

Volcano School of Arts and Sciences October 2023 News

Environmental Education through Art with Artist George Nuku

George Tamihana Nuku, one of the world's most prominent Maori contemporary artists, spent three weeks in artistic residence at the Volcano Art Center Niaulani Campus, where he worked with students of the Volcano School of Arts & Sciences. This artist/environmental educator, a native of Aotearoa

(New Zealand), has exhibited in France, Austria, and throughout the world. His most recent multi-media show, "Changing Oceans, Changing Minds," was created in Volcano over a three-week period in August and displayed at the Volcano Art Center. Nuku's vision and passion sparked this show, but the works themselves were made by VSAS 3rd and 5th graders, as well as middle school and high school students, and about four dozen members of the Volcano community.

Nuku is a sculptor and carver, working primarily in stone, wood, bone, shell, styrofoam and polystyrene; the pieces in this show are made up of recycled plastics in an attempt to reduce marine debris. The art is a tool for environmental education, as well as an inspirational call to action to halt, before it's too late, the human-caused environmental degradation of the planet.

"We must stop," Nuku said, standing before a huge relief map of Hawai'i Island made of reused styrofoam and soda bottle caps. "Our feet are hanging over the precipice. If we can step back, this art will remind us of how close we came."

The show provided an opportunity for VSAS students to directly connect our home in Hawai'i with the rest of Polynesia, and artistically experience our shared ocean environment and cultural heritage. In creating this show VSAS



students, under the supervision of the artist, transformed hundreds of plastic bottles into jellyfish to be used in the sculptures, and performed countless other tasks to make the show an artistic and educational success. "It was really fun making jellyfish from plastic bottles," said third-grader Olivia Martin. "We cut the bottoms in half, then quarters, then eights. With recycling we kept plastic out of the ocean and turned trashed into beauty."

"Happiness Is..." 28th Japanese Language and Cultural Program at Volcano School

In further news, for two weeks in Sep-Ltember, four Japanese college students from Tokyo volunteered in the VSAS Japanese Language & Culture Program with the theme of "Happiness Is...", creating 31 presentations for grades PK-8, on topics such as Kabuki Theater, Sumo Wrestling, calligraphy performance, Japanese festivals, and more. It was the 28th of such projects conducted at VSAS with cooperation from WAVOC (the Hirayama Ikuo Volunteer Center) since 2004. The volunteer team demonstrated excellent teamwork and communication skills, and enjoyed staying with VSAS host families who generously opened their homes and hearts to the volunteers. Highlights of the project included a mochi pounding event held on 'Ohana Night using a 200 lb urn on loan from Nā'ālehu Hongwanji, and a final night spent dancing the night away at the annual Pahala Hongwanji Bon Dance with many VSAS students also in attendance. The young volunteers from Japan were surprised to see the extent to which traditional Japanese culture is alive and thriv-

ing in our local communities here on Hawai'i Island in the districts of Puna and Ka'ū, where the majority of our students live. Mahalo to all participants, support families and administration. One 5th grade student commented, "I learned that Japan is a safe and peaceful country with no theft." A 7th grader declared that she "hopes to attend Waseda University " in the future. Our next WAVOC-VSAS Japanese educational support project will be held Feb. 18 – March 3, 2024. HAWAII NATIONAL PARK, Hawai'i – Open up your October calendar and make time to delve into Hawaiian cultural practices, restore native rainforest or treat yourself to a ranger-guided hike or After Dark in the Park program with these upcoming events at Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park:

All events are free, but entrance fees may apply. Some programs are sponsored by Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park and Hawai'i Pacific Parks Association. Programs are subject to change or cancellation without notice. Check the park calendar for more information.

Pala'ie (Loop and Ball) Demonstration. Join park rangers and staff from Hawai'i Pacific Parks Assocation to make and play with pala'ie (loop and ball). Pre-contact Hawaiians had many interesting games that are seldom seen today. Pala'ie are constructed from natural materials and are a simple and enduring source of good fun. Part of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park's ongoing 'Ike Hana No'eau (Experience the Skillful Work) Hawaiian cultural programs, and co-sponsored by Hawai'i Pacific Parks Association and the Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park. Free, but park entrance fees apply. When: Wednesday, October 11 from 10 a.m. to noon. Where: 'Ōhi'a Wing (across Crater Rim Drive from Kīlauea Visitor Center)

Hawaiian Chant. Long before the Hawaiian people had a written language, they passed along traditional knowledge and culture through moʻolelo (story), hula, mele (song and poetry) and oli (chant). Kekuhi Kanahele Kealiʻikanakaʻole of Lonoa Honua guides us to connect with the landscapes of Hawaiʻi on a deeper level. Passed down by her grandmother, Edith Kekuhi Kanakaʻole, her performances and guidance have touched thousands of lives. This is event is expected to be well attended. Part of Hawaiʻi Volcanoes' ongoing After Dark in the Park programs and co-sponsored by the Friends of Hawaiʻi Volcanoes National Park. Free, but park entrance fees apply. When: Tuesday, October 17 at 7 p.m. Where: Kīlauea Visitor Center auditorium

Hālau Hula Kauluola Performance. Hālau Hula Kauluola of Keaukaha, under the direction of Kumu Hula Noʻeau and Pōlanimakamae Kahakalau-Kalima, will perform with members of their youthful hālau. Part of Hawaiʻi Volcanoes National Park's ongoing Nā Leo Manu (Heavenly Voices) Hawaiian music and performance programs, and co-sponsored by Hawaiʻi Pacific Parks Association. Free, but park entrance fees apply. When: Wednesday, October 18 from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m. Where: Kīlauea Visitor Center auditorium

Coffee Talk: The Restoration of Ka Hoʻomana Kahiko. Join Kahakaʻio Ravenscraft and learn about the revitalization of hoʻomana kahiko, traditional Hawaiian spiritual practices, including the observation of kaulana mahina, the celestial calendar. Kahakaiʻo dedicates his work to perpetuating the traditions of his ancestors through the practice of kalai kiʻi (sculpture), moʻo kūauhau (genealogy), moʻolelo (storytelling) and mālama iwi kūpuna (the care of traditional burial practices). 


