For long time residents, you know the drill and look forward to all the events. For all you newbies, I've heard this is the best small town celebration bar none!


Let's start with all the things you can look forward to:



# Pin-to-Pin: Where to Begin?

The intractable issues of a community. You all know what I mean. The ones where the kids go away to college, have their own kids, leave the rat race behind, retire to the community they grew up in—and yep, still there. Decades have passed, but how would you ever know? The head-lines remain stuck in time.

In a 2006 article, "Upset by Clearing" featuring the all too memorable caption, "The Californication of Volcano", a group of residents stand around looking rightfully bewildered in a vast pin-to-pin cleared lot. The photo could literally have been taken today. Or just run again and most would never have noticed.

But one wants to protest, to champion all the efforts made by so many over so many years to stop this destruction of our incredible tropical montane forest—which from a biodiversity perspective is literally one of one of the most precious forests in the world for our collective future. But as it says straight out of 2006, "nothing illegal has been alleged and nothing illegal has apparently been done".

Which is to say that throughout all this effort, through blood, sweat, and tears (and if you've ever hand-cleared a lot in Volcano—you know just what I mean), we as a community have not yet succeeded to use THE KEY TOOL—used by people everywhere—to say what is RIGHT and what is WRONG. To lay out what will just keep happening—and what stops NOW:

#### Laws.

Which is also by no means to denigrate grassroots community-driven protest and action—without it, all is lost. However, reality check for us Volcano: It has not worked.

Which is to say it is necessary—our community's life's blood even—but clearly not sufficient.

Remember: This very morning in the forests of Volcano a 100,000+ pounds D9 bulldozer can obliterate 5 million years of one-of-a-kind forest evolution from pin-to-pin in an hour—and no one here can do much of anything to stop it—without getting arrested that is.

SO....how about it? Are we ok to keep it this way Volcano? Is that good by you? Because what if instead—we were to actually make a change?

What if instead we start this year to write a County Ordinance that will codify our passion for our native forest in Volcano? What if we finally move this legal means called a "Forest Protection Overlay" out of the arena of community passion and into the realm of solid public policy?

I know firsthand and for certain that there is direct support from Hawai'i County Long Range Planning for codifying forest protections in Volcano that will have a truly lasting and generational impact. In other words, the moment—for that once in a lifetime type of rare alignment one typically only sees in the stars—is actually here.

This does not mean it will just be easy however.

For anyone who has tried in Volcano to make positive systemic change, one might understand if in the end they chose to return to the easier work of hand-clearing lots. But I do not believe this is not because of our community itself—but rather because the thicket of regulatory bodies and powers-that-be in Volcano—is as remarkable in its complexity as the forest can be impenetrable, at first, to the simple human hand.

Indeed, it will take a remarkable level of dedication and focused

mind if we are to successfully seize this moment we have now been given. But I for one believe that the small team—that will make this happen—lives now already in the Volcano area and will read this article or hear about it soon in their own way.

So consider this your call to action! Stand up and be counted! Dedicate a portion of your time to something that will make all your other time on Earth more satisfying, more meaningful. Let's make the last 5 Million years of evolution's sacred work here—just a downpayment on the 5 Million years of unfolding biodiversity yet to come!

SUNDAY WALK IN THE PARK - KAHUKU PALM TRAIL Sunday, June 11, 2023 - 10:00 am to 2:00 pm

This monthly program on second Sundays is aimed at bringing together the members of the Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park to explore the park's beautiful trails. This month we will walk the Kahuku Palm Trail.

Palm Trail is a moderately difficult 2.6-mile loop traversing scenic pastures along an ancient cinder cone, with some of the best panoramic views Kahuku has to offer. Highlights include relics of the ranching era, sections of remnant native forest and amazing volcanic features from the 1868 eruptive fissures.

Enter the Kahuku unit of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park on the mauka (uphill) side of Highway 11 near mile marker 70.5, and meet near the parking area.

Sturdy footwear, water, raingear, sun protection, and a snack are recommended.

This event is presented by the Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. Program cost is FREE for Friends members. Non-members are welcome to join the Friends in order to attend. And, of course, additional donations are always accepted. Park entrance fees apply.

# Earth Day SUCCESS!

The 1st Annual Earth Day Festival recently held on Saturday, April 22, 2023 at the Volcano Village Cooper Center was a huge success!

The festival was a great opportunity for people to learn about sustainability and to take a action to protect the planet.

With an estimated 150 attendees, the event featured booths from a range of local environmental organizations, County of Hawaii Recycling, the Big Island Invasive Species Committee, and the UH-Hilo Forestry program educating on preventing the spread of Rapid Ohia Death. Gracing us were special Guest Speakers including Native Hawaiian Practitioner, Kumu Meleana Manuel, and one of the original Founders of Earth Day and Volcano resident, Dr. Bruce Miller. Some vendors selling sustainable products were Rainbow Repurpose and Grow Native—just to name a few.

Highlighting our event was the Mana'o Room, where attendees and residents gave voice to their feedback on a wide range of potential future topics, projects, and initiatives of the Volcano Community Association (see more on right).

VCA plans to make the Earth Day Fest an annual anchoring event for the community, and they hope to see many more people attend next year. So if you missed us this year, be sure to mark your calendar for 2024!

#### **COMMUNITY VOICES: Your Feedback**

Visitors to the Mana'o Room at VCA's Earth Day Fest were asked to share their opinions on 80 possible initiatives for the VCA to pursue in our mission of improving quality of life in Volcano. A digital survey was also sent out to the community, garnering 80 responses.

Celebrating Earth Day and offering opportunities for feedback were in the Top 10 (and we plan to keep doing both). Some other popular ideas for the Volcano Community:

- 1. Library
- 2. Summer Arts Festival
- 3. Skatepark Updates

All three of these ideas got an additional boost from grants VCA has already identified to possibly make them a reality.

Volcano is really in love with the idea of having a true coffeehouse. Ideally, I would guess, the kind of great community place where people can hang out for hours and talk story.

Along with a garden center and a full service bookstore, which were also very popular, our community would appear to be ready for a few new businesses. Though, from what I'm hearing, only businesses that further anchor us to what we already value: education, community, the arts, and nature (oh, and a fine cup a' Joe).

Also popular was the idea of an online events calendar where everyone could access events in one place. It's a great idea and we are looking into it.

Of course, Volcano still wants its HI5 service back. This this is currently tied to unlocking more funding at the State level, because no one bid on the current contract as written.

Other ideas which garnered popular response and which the VCA is already working on currently, include a walking trail network repurposing the unused paper roads, a new vision for the Cooper Center and the much broader plan for "Volcano Park", and putting the force of law behind conserving our native forest. That said, there are more than enough talented folks in Volcano to make far more of these initiatives a reality, so please reach out and get involved!

#### Kapapala Ranch to be Subject of Talk

The evolution of Kapapala Ranch will be the subject of a talk and slideshow presentation this month at Volcano Art Center.

Lani Petrie, who along with her husband Bill, have leased and run the historic ranch just south of Volcano since 1977, will cover the ecology and history of the area, taking people on a trip through the earliest days of the area, the Great Mahele, plantation days, and more than 160 years of Kapapala as a working ranch.

She will also discuss the ranch's relationship to Hawaii Volcanoes National Park, state forest reserves, Highway 11, Ohaikea, Kipuka Ki, and the recent transfer of the property to the state Department of Agriculture.

The presentation is sponsored by the Volcano Community Association in association with the Volcano Art Center. It will be from 6 to 7:30 p.m. Thursday, June 22 in the Art Center's Varez Hall. The talk is free but donations are welcome.



**Battle of Midway: A Japanese Perspective.** The Battle of Midway, June 4 – 7, 1942, marked a turning point in World War II. #### VSAS Students Initiate Legislation for Indigenous Peoples' Day & Bill Passes!

Beginning this year, Indigenous Peoples' Day will be an official Observed Holiday in the state of Hawai'i. Senate Bill 732 passed unanimously in both houses of the State Legislature and on May 3 was sent to Gov. Josh Green for his signature. None of this would have happened without VSAS middle school students, who were passionate about creating a holiday that honors indigenous cultures.

The effort began when Kumu Barbara Sarbin's students learned that in a previous session a similar bill hadn't even gotten a legislative hearing, so they contacted their state senator, Dru Kanuha (Kona, Ka'u, Volcano). "[The students] really wanted to bring awareness to the state's obligation to protect all rights traditionally exercised by Native Hawaiians, as well as other indigenous cultures through the world," said Kanuha. Ultimately, the students convinced him to introduce a new bill. The concepts, and even the wording in Kanuhua's bill, came directly from the students.

"The legislature finds that indigenous peoples, including Native Hawaiians, have thrived and remained resilient for generations, contributing to the world through rich histories, knowledge and cultural practices.

"However," the legislation continues, "generations of federal and state policies sought to bring shame upon, assimilate and displace indigenous peoples and eradicate native cultures....resulting in an 84% decline in Native Hawaiian population in the first





sixty years since Captain James Cook's arrival in the islands in 1778."

The measure further notes that South Dakota was the first state to rename the holiday honoring European colonizer Christopher Columbus with a day recognizing the true natives of the land. Although Hawai'i has never celebrated Columbus Day, in 1988 it began observing Discoverer's Day (honoring the first Polynesian explorers to land here). This new measure goes even further. According to the new law, "Indigenous Peoples' Day will serve to educate Hawai'i's people about the original inhabitants of the 'āina....as well as to celebrate the revival of previously-taboo cultural practices, such as hula and 'Ōlelo Hawai'i, and all cultures that form Hawai'i today."

This is just what VSAS students were after. They didn't want an official state holiday when schools would close. Rather, they hoped for an "observed holiday," when school would be in session and the day devoted to sharing and celebrating a variety of indigenous cultures. Henceforth, the second Monday in October will officially be Indigenous Peoples' Day in Hawai'i. "This process has really empowered the kids," Kumu Sarbin said. "They learned they really can make a difference in important ways."


