

SUNDAY WALK IN THE PARK – KĪPUKAPUAULU – BIRD PARK Sunday, April 14, 2024 – 9:00 am to 11:00 am

This monthly program on second Sundays is aimed at bringing together the members of the Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park to explore the park's beautiful trails. This month's walk explores the Kipukapuaulu area, also known as Bird Park.

This 1.2 mile (1.9km) loop trail reveals a story of struggle and survival for some of Hawai'i's rarest plants and animals. This walk will take you through a "Kīpuka", an area of older vegetation surrounded by a more recent lava flow from Mauna Loa.

Of interest: A unique biological diversity of rare plants, birds, insects, very old-growth forest of koa and ōhi'a trees.

#### **Difficulty:** Easy

Distance from Visitor Center to trailhead: Approximately 5.0 miles (8.0km). South on Highway 11, turn right on Mauna Loa Road and travel 1.5 miles (2.4km) to the Kipukapuaulu parking area.

Bring: Water, hat, sunscreen and rain gear. Be prepared for sometimes hot, wet or windy weather conditions.



#### Embrace Alternative Transportation:



Denis Hayes was a 25-year-old student at Harvard Kennedy School in 1969 but dropped out after a semester to become a principal organizer of a grass-roots nonprofit that planned a nationwide rally on April 22, 1970, an event they would call Earth Day. That oneday gathering to raise awareness of threats to the environment, held in hundreds of cities and towns across the country, attracted a reported 20 million people.



Rachel Carson was posthumously awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Jimmy Carter

Rachel Carson was an American marine biologist, writer, and conservationist whose sea trilogy and book Silent Spring are credited with advancing marine conservation and the global environmental movement. Silent Spring spurred a nationwide ban on DDT and other pesticides and inspired a grassroots environmental movement that led to the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency.

#### Punalu'u, VSAS Students Advocate to Protect a Local Treasure

23 VSAS students were among hundreds of people attending the Windward Planning Commission meeting on March 7 to hear testimony from the public on a proposed 147-acre commercial and residential development at Punalu'u. Among forth-some residents and supporters who testified in opposition to the development were VSAS students, Leiahi'ena Ka'awa and Alden Wells.

Leiahi'ena Ka'awa, a junior at VSAS and lineal descendant from Punalu'u and Ninole, testified, "Punalu'u is home to native, endemic and endangered plants and animals, ancient and traditional places of worship and ceremony, ancestral burials and fresh water springs... [which] have provided the people of Ka'ū an abundance of food and resources to feed the multitudes of generations," she said. "The untouched and undeveloped state of Punalu'u would allow us to keep these practices alive. I speak today in hopes of finding a more sustainable and practical avenue of land management to the fragile environment that Punalu'u is."

Punalu'u is a wahi pana long recognized for its archeological and ecological significance, which includes heiau, a historic cemetery, petroglyphs, koa shrines, ancient burial sites, and one of the last undeveloped coastlines in Hawai'i. It is also a nesting ground for the endangered hawksbill and green sea turtles, and a refuge for endangered Hawaiian monk seals, all of whom are protected by law.

According to 'Ōlelo No'eau #1887, "Kū ka hale i Punalu'u, i Ka-wai-hū-o-



Kauila. The house stands at Punalu'u, at the gushing water of Kauila. [Said of one who has found peace and comfort at last.] Ka-wai-hū-o-Kauila is a spring that was a gift of the turtle goddess to the people of Punalu'u (Pukui, 1983)

Many of VSAS students are from Punalu'u. Throughout the years, VSAS elementary, middle school, and high school students have held classes at Punalu'u to kilo (observe) natural phenomena, listen to stories from local kupuna, conduct scientific studies, clear invasive plants, learn mo'olelo, and much more. Elementary students study the endangered hawksbill turtle, culminating in excursions to Punalu'u to watch the newly-hatched baby turtles scurry from their nests into the ocean for the very first time.

Black Sand Beach, LLC, (headed by California resident Eva Liu), has submitted a plan to develop the area. The proposed plan, called Punalu'u Village, includes 225 luxury vacation and residential rental units, a fish market and seafood restaurant, a retail strip, a private wellness center with a gym, pool and dozens of individual 1500-squarefoot bungalows, as well as expansion

of the existing golf course and other amenities.

This is not the first time in recent years that outside interests have attempted to develop the area. In the 1970s, a golf course and condo complex was built, along with a restaurant just mauka of Ninole Pond that was destroyed by a tsunami in 1975. In 2006 a subdivision of over 1,400 single- and multi-family homes and short-term rentals was proposed. Based on their overwhelming opposition, Ka'ū residents were able to stop this latter development.

Alden Wells, VSAS senior, testified, "Punalu'u is one of the only places left on this island... that has these coral reef ecosystems that are still thriving," said VSAS senior Alden Wells. "I speak on behalf of my generation and those who will come after me."

After eight hours of testimony and 50 more people still waiting to testify before the Planning Commission on March 7, the Commission recessed. The hearing will resume at a date yet to be announced and the public is invited.

All events are free, but entrance fees may apply. Some programs are sponsored by the National Parks Arts Foundation, Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park and Hawai'i Pacific Parks Association. Programs are subject to change or cancellation without notice. Check the park calendar for more information.

Meet Artist-in-Residence Rick San Nicholas. The 'ahu 'ula (feather cloak) and the mahiole (feather helmet) symbolized the highest rank of the chiefly ali'i class of ancient Hawai'i. April's artist-in-residence Rick San Nicholas is a kumu hulu nui, a master of ancient Hawaiian featherwork. He will demonstrate the art of Hawaiian featherwork as it was done in old Hawai'i, a long and painstaking process with breathtaking results. Part of Hawai'i Volcanoes' ongoing After Dark in the Park programs and co-sponsored by the National Parks Arts Foundation and Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park. #### **National Park Week Events**

Journey at the Summit. Families are invited an adventurous roleplaying quest to kick off National Park Week on this fee-free day!

The fun starts at the welcome tent near the Kīlauea Visitor Center, where you'll pick up an adventure pack and directions to activity stations located within a half-mile of the visitor center. Each station features a challenge and a dice roll to guide your quest. Complete the required tasks and return to the welcome tent to claim your prize. When: Saturday, April 20 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Where: Start and finish at the welcome tent near the bus parking area at Kīlauea Visitor Center – FREE!

Kahuku Coffee Talk: The Pit Crater and its Ancient Rainforest. The large pit crater is one of the jewels of Kahuku. Its nearly 150-foot vertical walls envelop dense native forest, and from its overlook you look down on treetops to see a land-scape from ka wa kahiko (ancient times). David Benitez, former park ecologist, led surveys into the crater that documented more than 100 plant species, many rare and endangered. Hear how David, along with multi-agency teams, rappelled into the crater and how the collections are being used today to restore rare and endangered native plants throughout the park. Ka'ū coffee will be available for purchase. **When:** Saturday, April 20 from 9:30 a.m. to 11 a.m. **Where:** Kahuku Visitor Contact Station, just south of the 70.5 mile marker on the mauka side of Highway 11 in Ka'ū.

**Hoku: Beneath the Hawaiian Moon.** From Hawaiian constellations and moon phases to the elusive Lyrids meteor showers, this event is all about looking up with wonder into the night sky. Join astronomer Emily Peavy of the Gemini International Observatory/NOIRLab for a special evening that celebrates the Hoku moon phase with telescopes, presentations, hot cocoa, and weather permitting, spectacular closeup views of the full moon. Dress warmly. Part of Hawai'i Volcanoes' ongoing After Dark in the Park programs and co-sponsored by the Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park. Free, but park entrance fees apply. **When:** Tuesday, April 23 at 7 p.m. **Where:** Kīlauea Visitor Center auditorium

### Traffic safety and infrastructure upgrades near park entrance will begin soon

HAWAII NATIONAL PARK, Hawai'i – Driving into Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park will soon look different and ultimately be safer for everyone in the near future.

Work to prepare for the installation of a traffic roundabout just beyond the park entrance began March 4. The upgrades also include plans to realign Crater Rim Drive and add an administrative lane at the entrance station. Workers have fenced off 33 parking stalls east of Kīlauea Visitor Center as a staging area for the traffic safety project, creating less parking.

Some sections of forest near the entrance will be removed in the weeks ahead but will be restored as much as possible. The park's natural resources team has propagated 'ōhi'a and other endemic plants from the area and will replant once the work is complete. The park consulted with kūpuna about this process and is committed to minimizing the loss of forest. To prevent the spread of Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death and non-native species, all workers are required to follow the park's stringent invasive pest and green waste protocols.

"We want the community and visitors to be prepared for the changes, which will eventually make it safer to enter and explore the park," said Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park Superintendent Rhonda Loh. "We appreciate everyone's patience and understanding."

The addition of an administrative lane and the realignment of the Crater Rim Drive intersection into a roundabout will improve traffic flow and address visitor experience issues. The upgrades will result in less frequent backups onto Highway 11, a major safety concern especially during eruptions when park visitation soars.

Crews will also conduct important infrastructure upgrades to water, fiber optic and electrical lines underground between the park entrance and visitor center.

The traffic safety upgrades are included with the National Park Service's (NPS) nearly two-year Disaster Recovery Project following the eruption and collapse of Kīlauea volcano's summit in 2018. Following the disaster, the NPS completed civic engagement, public scoping and an Environmental Assessment (EA). The park released a Finding of No Significant Impact on the plan in December 2022 to move forward with the project and the traffic safety




