NOAA Predicts Busy VERT 2023 Pacific Hurricane Season



The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) released their 2023 central Pacific hurricane season outlook on May 25, stating there is a 50-percent chance of above normal hurricane activity.

Due to a strengthening El Niño (discussed in last month's issue), four to seven tropical cyclones are expected for the central Pacific/Hawai'i region. A "normal" season usually sees four to five tropical cyclones. Tropical cyclones include not only hurricanes, but also tropical storms and tropical depressions, all of which can cause substantial damage and potentially life-threatening conditions. The prediction is not a forecast, but a broad scale outlook based on developing and anticipated conditions.

In a NOAA press release, Chris Brenchley, director of NOAA's Central Pacific Hurricane Center, states, "The last few hurricane seasons have been pretty quiet around Hawai'i, luring some folks to let their guard down. Now it's looking like this season will be more active than the past several years. It's more important than ever to review your emergency plan and supply kit now, so you will be prepared for the next hurricane threat."

Hurricane season began on June 1st and continues through November 30. If historic trends hold true for this year, most activity will occur mid- to late summer. However, as seen recently with the devasting impacts of Typhoon Mawar on Guam (and it didn't even make a direct hit to the island), tropical cyclone formation can occur earlier or later than predicted. Unprecedented warming of sea surface temperatures is making for more frequent and stronger storm systems.

This prediction may sound scary, but if you calmly and methodically make preparations ahead of time it will go a long way towards relieving any storm anxiety. There is a wealth of information online and elsewhere about storm preparation, which will be the subject of next month's article. The Volcano Emergency Response Team (VERT) has been gearing up for hurricane season, and is ready to activate should the Volcano area be cut off from outside help during and after a tropical cyclone. If you are elderly, use life-sustaining medical devices, live alone, or are in any other way vulnerable during a disaster, please register on VERT's Vulnerable Resident List by emailing VERT Commander Doug Wilson at douscelle@aol.com and the VERT team at verthawaii@gmail.com.

SUNDAY WALK IN THE PARK — EXPLORING MAUNA ULU & PU'UHULUHULU Sunday, July 9, 2023 - 10:00 am to 1:00 pm

This monthly program on second Sundays is aimed at bringing together the members of the Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park to explore the park's beautiful trails. This month we will explore Mauna Ulu and Pu'uhuluhulu.

Experience a lava landscape from the 1969-1974 Mauna Ulu flow. Walk by lava tree molds and climb 210 feet (64m) to the top of a forested cinder cone, Pu'uhuluhulu (hairy hill). View Mauna Ulu's steaming sheild, which is similar to the Pu'u 'Ō'ō cone in the distance. On a clear day you can see Mauna Loa, Mauna Kea and the Pacific Ocean.

Of interest: Pāhoehoe and 'a'ā lava, kīpuka (old land surrounded by new land), lava tree molds, cinder cones, lava rampart, native pioneer plants and trees and panoramic vista.

Sturdy footwear, water, raingear, sun protection, and a snack are recommended.

This event is presented by the Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. Program cost is \$5.00 for Friends members. Non-members are welcome to join the Friends in order to attend. And, of course, additional donations are always accepted. Park entrance fees apply.

RENEW VOLCANO PARK!!!

Visitors to Volcano may not fathom the depth of effort and care that has gone into our beloved Cooper Center since its original dedication in 1987. What's more, they may not realize that prior to the Cooper Center, the idea of a community park for Volcano has had a long life.

Indeed, the first calls for a Volcano Park came right after WWII, through the once thriving Kilauea Volcano Recreation Club. Over the intervening decades, a wide range of civic groups all took up the cause—including Volcano Farmer's Association, Keakealani School PTA, Volcano Kumiai, Volcano Lions Club, and Volcano Seniors Association.

However, it was only with the founding in 1980 of Hui 'O Volcano, later the Volcano Community Association, that the longtime dream of Volcano—to have a place, a Volcano Park, to increase the quality of life for its residents and visitors alike—got on track to completion.

Along the way, as with most long held dreams, a range of stories have played out that we might now learn from, as we look to what the possible future of Volcano Park may hold.

For instance, few realize that in 1975 the County appropriated \$241K (or \$1.35M in 2023 dollars) for the full build-out of the 10 acre Volcano Park, including volleyball, basketball and tennis courts, and a baseball field (ie Master Plan #1). However, due to the community being unable to agree what site to use—the funding lapsed—never truly to return.

After a fresh look at Volcano Park (ie Master Plan #2) some funding did come through, albeit a decade later, Volcano accepted just \$65,000 in its place due to County budget constraints at the time. Instead volunteering to do everything else itself, including clearing the land, constructing the building, even hiring the architect—but limited their focus to just the building itself.

While this unprecedented community effort forged a remarkable spirit within the lifeblood of Volcano that lives on to this day, it was perhaps also rendered bittersweet when the same year the County approved \$583K (\$1.55M in 2023 dollars) for a similar size community center in Pahala.

This 1981 master plan was then followed in 1994 by yet another master plan for Volcano Park (ie Master Plan #3), now also including an indoor swimming pool, 11K sq ft enclosed multipurpose building, workshop/craft center, hula pavilion etc. But only Carlson Court was ever completed.

So when we review this history I think what we see is the following: 1) without community alignment funding means little and significant opportunities are lost, 2) with community alignment even a very small budget can go a very long way, 3) so with community alignment and a significant budget at the same time, there is every reason to believe we can realize the longstanding dream of a true fullservice Volcano Park for Volcano's whole population. Young and old and everything in between. This is why I say, "Renew Volcano Park!!!"

HISTORIC HOMES TOURS

Tolcano Community Foundation will offer two historic homes tours during the upcoming Experience Volcano Festival.

On Saturday July 29 participants will have the opportunity to visit the Shipman "Mountain" House to get an up-close look at some of the architectural details and how the structure was modified over the years. There will also be an opportunity to learn a bit about the family and their history on the island. From the Shipman House the group will walk to Bidea-Wee to stroll through the Japanese garden designed by A. T. Yamamoto and learn about the current owner's reforestation efforts.

The Sunday July 30 tour will be a walking tour on Hale Ohia Road, one of Volcano's first areas to be developed. The street has a plantation inspired cottage, a Craftsman bungalow, a plantation-style manager's home, a simple rectangular home with protected lanai, and one of the earliest log cabins known to be built in Hawaii.

Tours start at 11:30am and tickets may be purchased beginning at 10:00am from the Volcano Community Foundation booth in front of Kilauea Lodge. Cost is \$20 per person and space is limited.

Please note that there is no parking available at the Shipman House or on Hale Ohia Road. Participants must find parking elsewhere and walk to the starting location.

Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park July 2023

All events are free, but entrance fees may apply. Some programs are sponsored by Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park and Hawai'i Pacific Parks Association. Programs are subject to change or cancellation without notice. Check the park calendar for more information.

Birds Not Mosquitoes: Wolbachia to the Rescue. Hawaiian honeycreepers have been called the "jewels of the forest," and at one time there were over 55 species of these native forest birds. Deeply linked to Hawaiian culture, just 17 species remain with six listed as critically endangered. Dr. Chris Farmer, Hawai'i program director for the American Bird Conservancy, shares new hope: mosquito "birth control" to prevent avian malaria. Wolbachia bacteria is used around the world to help protect people from deadly mosquito-borne illness, and will be used in Hawai'i to protect Hawaiian forest birds from avian malaria. Learn to Make Tī Leaf Lei. Join park rangers and Hawai'i Pacific Parks Association staff who will demonstrate how to make one of the most popular and traditional lei in Hawai'i from tī leaves. Make and wear your own lei! Part of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park's ongoing 'Ike Hana No'eau (Experience the Skillful Work) Hawaiian cultural programs, and co-sponsored by Hawai'i Pacific Parks Association and the Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park. Free, but park entrance fees apply. When: Wednesday, July 12 from 10 a.m. to noon Where: 'Ōhi'a Wing (across Crater Rim Drive from Kīlauea Visitor Center)

The Hawaiian Volcano Observatory on Uēkahuna: A Legacy of Science. Perched high on the rim of Uēkahuna since the late 1940s, the Hawaiian Volcano Observatory has been the hub of research and monitoring of Hawaiian volcanoes. The Reginald T. Okamura Building, constructed in 1985 and the heart of the observatory, was damaged beyond repair during the earthquakes of 2018. Join Don Swanson, who has a 55-year association with the observatory, as he takes us through the science conducted at this remarkable facility and the legacy being carried into the future. Part of Hawai'i Volcanoes' ongoing After Dark in the Park programs and sponsored by the Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park. Free, but park entrance fees apply. The Hawaiian Cultural Festival is Back! Celebrate Hawaiian culture at Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park's 39th annual Cultural Festival, held in the beautiful Kahuku Unit in Ka'ū, free! Come listen to Hawaiian and island-inspired music by renowned performers including Kenneth Makuakāne, Russell Mauga, the Kīpapa Sisters and Ka'ū favorites, Ke'aiwa. Enjoy hula performances and try your hand at traditional Hawaiian crafts. Participating hālau and practitioners will be announced next month. The 39th annual Cultural Festival will be a fun-filled, family-friendly day that shares the connection of Hawaiian people to the 'āina. Food and refreshments will be available for sale. Water, raingear, and sun protection are recommended. When: Saturday, July 22 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Where: Kahuku is on the mauka side of Highway 11 near mile marker 70.5, a 50-minute drive south of the park's main entrance.

Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument. Papahānaumokuākea is the largest protected conservation area on Earth as well as a World Heritage Site. The area provides critical habitat for endangered Hawaiian monk seals, threatened Hawaiian green sea turtles, and over 14 million seabirds. Native Hawaiian cultural reconnection with these islands, and active leadership in management, has ensured this protection will last. Join Andy Collins, education coordinator with the Mokupāpapa Discovery Center in Hilo as we take a virtual visit to this amazing and remote part of Hawai'i. 














July 2023 at the Volcano Art Center & Gallery


