

Volcano School Teachers Look Forward to Returning to School

7 Jolcano School teachers are looking forward to welcoming students back to school on August 3! While some students excelled with remote learning last year, the majority of Volcano School students rely on daily in person face-to-face instruction with a teacher. The school also offers a blended learning option-Kula 'Amakihi Community-Education program—for Based students who work well in a home environment and whose parents want to take a more active role in their child's education.

Like other schools. The Volcano School of Arts & Sciences uses the Hawai'i Department of Health (DOH) Guidance for Schools as a basis for decisions about reopening. These criteria include community spread indicators (number of cases per 100,000) and percent positive cases as well as the mitigation measures that are in place at the school. For the most recent DOH guidance including charts showing current community spread rates by island, visit: https://health.hawaii.gov/coronavirusdisease2019/resources/school -guidance/

COVID-19 mitigation measures are fully implemented at the school. These include mask wearing, social distancing, health screening, hand hygiene, 'ohana bubbles, cleaning and disinfection, and procedures for contact tracing and quarantining. The plan for the 21-22 school-year is for

all students in the Campus program to return to school in person full-time. At the time of this writing, DOH had not released guidance for schools on mask-wearing. "We anticipate wearing masks will be required with allowable breaks and accommodations, such as for a documented health concern." Principal Kinney said.

Currently, the school is not allowed to provide information regarding teachers and staff who are vaccinated. At this time, vaccination is a personal choice. Information about whether or not someone has been vaccinated is confidential and protected under HIPAA law.

If there is a rise in COVID-19, the school may need to pivot to blended learning either on a modified (e.g. A/B) schedule or full time. "What we have learned most of all from this past year is that we need to be prepared for anything." Kinney said. "Safety will always be our first priority, but we will do everything possible to keep our kids in school."

Teachers are looking forward to seeing all of our students and return to some normalcy. Despite the pandemic, Volcano School has continued to grow and thrive. We are ready to take experiencial place-based learning to a new level with a rapidly expanding list of local, state, and global partners!

The Volcano School of Arts & Sciences is a free Hawaiian-Focused Public Charter School serving PreK – 10th Grade. Learning through Volcano's unique natural and cultural

resources to become creative global citizens since 2001.

recently enjoyed showing a vet-Lerinarian surgeon around the Park, spending the day reviewing my relationship with animals. With the foundation of Hawaii Islands' animal diversity and history to anchor us, we explored the connection to our carbon-based brethren. Audrey said that there are three kinds of people who live with animals. Without stating the percentages of each type, she explained that some folks own pets, a word whose origin dates back to 15th century Scotland. The second sort is those who believe that their companions are equal to them. The third is submissive to those they live with, whether they know it or not. Without saying so to my guest, I struggle within the third category since 'my' alpha cat, Phantom, considers me a Wimp.

Audrey believes that we are no different from other animals. "The most common objection," she stated to her viewpoint, "is that humans are the only animals that know good and evil and have free will." Isn't that proof enough of our supremacy? "It would be," she said, "if there was any science supporting those concepts."

Isn't there?

"No. We have science that confirms the existence of pain and pleasure. We're learning about how animals make decisions. So far, free will is not found anywhere in nature."

I state, "Well, I feel I have free will." Audrey gave me a kindly and supportive look and said, "Feels great, doesn't it?" Not wanting to threaten the entire foundation of my identity, I decided to move on to another subject, one complimentary. "From my perspective," I said, "the profession of Veterinarian seems to be exceptionally compassionate and selfless." Audrey looked at me

with gentle disdain, much like Phantom often does, and related, "sixty percent of my graduating class work for the cattle and poultry industries."

Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park August 2021

Happy happy joy joy! The Stewardship at the Summit volunteer program returned to Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park Friday, July 16, 2021.

Come help restore the Hawaiian rainforest and remove invasive Himalayan ginger (aka "toilet brush ginger") at the summit of Kīlauea. Meet project leaders Paul & Jane Field outside Kīlauea Visitor Center at 8:45 a.m. Wear sturdy hiking shoes and long pants. Bring a hat, raingear, day pack, snacks and water. Gloves and tools are provided.

This non-edible ginger species is a noxious introduced plant that quickly takes over and prevents native plants from growing in their own habitats, but volunteer efforts really pay off! All along summit trails, 'ōhi'a trees, 'ama'u and hāpu'u tree ferns, pa'iniu (native lily), kāwa'u (native holly), and other important native plants are returning to areas where ginger has been removed.

2020-2021 Summit Eruption Hawaii Volcanoes National Park

On December 20, as lava cascaded into Halema'uma'u crater, it instantly vaporized the growing lake of water that had been developing in the crater since 2018. By December 24, it was replaced by a lava lake more than 500 feet deep.



It's a Bird; It's a Plant!

It's—both; it's kolea! Like Superman, the word kolea does double duty. It refers to both the migratory bird and the forest-dwelling tree. Kolea, the bird, is a golden plover (Pluvialis fulva) which flies here each winter to escape the cold and fatten up. It's always on its own and is often seen on well-maintained lawns. Kolea are very alert birds, with big black eyes always on the lookout for insects and potential predators. They have brown, black and white feathers which take on a striking appearance before they leave for the Arctic in the spring.

In the case of the plant, kolea refers to two different tree species, kolea lau nui (Myrsine lessertiana) and kolea lau li'i (Myrsine sandwicensis). Lau nui means large leaf and lau li'i means small leaf. The more common of these two endemic trees is kolea lau nui. It has smooth, leathery green leaves with a prominent mid-rib. Sometimes the new leaves will come out bright pink, a beautiful sight.




Why do a bird and a plant have the same name? Is it just a fluke or was it the outcome of some lost connection? Ancient Hawaiians sometimes gave the same name to completely different species. An example of this is loulu. We know loulu as a name for the native fan palm, but it is also the name for the Scrawled Filefish, which has a long tail fin that can be displayed as a fan. But the link does not have to be visual; it could be cultural or mythological. In the case of kolea, it is something once known but now perhaps lost to Father Time.
