Cooper Center Community Pantry News


This month's drive through food pantry is on Wednesday, November 29th from 9:30-11:00.

Hawaii Rotarians Donate \$2 Million for Maui Relief

Members of Rotary Clubs across the state have raised more than \$2 million to help survivors of the Maui wildfires in August. While Rotarians are known for their generosity and commitment to helping others, even District Gov. Mark Merriam said he was surprised that the clubs were able to raise so much money so quickly.

To date, more than \$250,000 of that money has been committed from The Maui Fire Relief Fund for emergency relief, including \$85,000 in gas and laundromat cards given to families that lost their homes, \$50,000 in specialized equipment for the only burn unit in the state at Straub Medical Center, and \$30,000 to each of the three Lahaina Rotary Clubs so club members can make decisions on how best to help the community.

During a visit to our Rotary Club of Volcano last month, Merriam said the group knows it is going to take years for Maui to recover. That's why Rotary has set up a committee composed of active Maui Rotary leaders to consider written proposals for distribution of the funds for in the short term, intermediate recovery, and long-term community rebuilding projects. .

Maui Rotarians have been on the ground providing support and relief to survivors daily, working at disaster relief centers, community hubs, moving supplies, and assisting in other ways. In all, we here in Volcano are proud of the way people are coming together to help. It's a great example of the Rotarian motto: Service Above Self.



Volcano Expands its Emergency Resource Network **VERT creates association with Vibrant Hawaii**

he Volcano Emergency Response Team (VERT) has registered with Vibrant Hawaii as one of its Resilience Hubs. Vibrant Hawaii, created in 2019, was established to serve communities throughout Hawaii County. One of its missions is to support communities, through its Resilience Hubs, by providing access to services, programs and resources to assist residents in becoming more resilient in adverse conditions and circumstances in their area.

Through its various collaborative partnerships, Vibrant Hawaii helps to coordinate emergency support functions across communities on Hawaii Island and provide training to assist Resilience Hubs in meeting their preparedness capability targets.

Vibrant Hawaii has 77 business and nonprofit Resilience Alliance Partners that can provide resources (in-kind, services, specialty skills) to support Points of Distribution and community Resilience Hubs in an emergency, and to assist communities in their recovery throughout Hawaii County.

Vibrant Hawaii has also established a working relationship with Hawaii County Civil Defense Agency (HCCDA) and has created a communications system to report current conditions, and to provide access to County emergency services at HCCDA's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) during an emergency.

If and when VERT is activated here in Volcano, this partnership will provide additional resources to assist our community before, during and after a disaster.

SUNDAY WALK IN THE PARK — FOOTPRINTS TRAIL (KEONEHELELEI) Sunday, November 12, 2023 - 10:00 am to 12:00 pm

This monthly program on second Sundays is aimed at bringing together the members of the Friends of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park to explore the park's beautiful trails.

Join us on a geological hike to explore features from Footprints Trail in the Ka'u Desert. The 2-mile round trip hike begins at the Footprints trailhead, where we will examine textural details of an 'a'ā lava flow. Once we descend to the sandy desert, we'll view footprints fossilized in the muddy ash by Keoua's fallen army in 1790.



HAWAI'I COUNTY UPDATES

Volcano Community Association summarizes recent developments in the community, the county and across Hawai'i.

NEW CLIMATE CHANGE DEPARTMENT

Office of Sustainability, Climate Change, Equity and Resilience

Hawaii County has a new Department to focus its climate change efforts, with its main role being to coordinate the efforts of all other departments to best work together. It will also serve as a channel for receiving Federal funding, much of it currently through the Inflation Reduction Act, which has many climate change provisions. Indeed, VCA is currently taking a leading role on a grant application through Hawai'i Department of Land and Natural Resources to receive significant funding for forest protection and education in Volcano.

DISTRICT 6 UPDATES

- Standards have now been tightened on the County's Agricultural Tax Credit Program to focus on actual agricultural use vs property owners using it as more of a convenient tax break loophole.
- The first round of applications for building affordable housing through the County's Affordable Housing Grant Program are now closed

 Animal Control Program Improvements for southern end of the Island are on their way and are being coordinated under another new County Department

LOCAL GRANT PROGRAM OPPORTUNITIES

Hawaii County Council has a nonprofit grant-in-aid program called the Waiwai program with up to 50K max. Its next deadline to submit an application is January 31st, 2024. Hawaii County R&D will award its next round of innovation grants in Spring 2024. Along with both of these, Michelle Galimba has her own County Council contingency relief funds with awards under 5K for local non-profits.

ENERGY & POWER UPDATES

David Kurohara, Hawaii Electric:

The primary cost of energy in Hawaii is driven by cost of oil and is a pass thru to customers at 0% profit for Hawaii Electric. Currently, 47.9% of Hawaii Island's generated energy portfolio is renewable, with the top 3 sources being wind (Kohala), geothermal (Puna) and hydro (Hilo).

Hawaii Electric's top customer priorities are affordability,

reliability, and resilience. As well, new federal and other grants are coming online soon for adding electric vehicle charging stations around the Island.

ENERGY EFFICIENCY AND REBATE PROGRAM

Graceson Ghen, Hawaii Energy (graceson.ghen@leidos.com, (808.895.6713)

Hawaii Energy is a residential ratepayer funded energy efficiency and rebate program through the PUC's Public Benefit Fund. The plan for Hawaii is to be 100% renewable by 2045—30% from energy efficiency and reduced consumption, driven by the efforts of Hawaii Energy.

BROADBAND INTERNET ACCESS EXPANDING

Riley Saito, Hawaii County Economic Development Specialist, Broadband

A recent Federal award of \$149M to Hawaii Island for equal access to broadband internet should be sufficient to extend broadband to all of Hawaii Island as it is invested from 2025-2030. Of this amount, \$15M has been granted for internet literacy education as well, with this priorities being unserved and then underserved. Hawaii County intends to extend free fiber optic broadband to all County Facilities on or near Hawaii Belt Road-here's to hoping Fuhrmann Firehouse and Cooper Center are on their list!

FERAL PIG UPDATE

Glenn Sako, Hawaii County Economic Development Specialist, Agriculture

An exciting new and potentially lasting solution to the feral pig crisis in Hawaii is beginning to be implemented now, an initiative of the group Malama O Puna, with the pilot project supported by R&D funds from the County.

The components of the project are as follows:

1) empower residents to report pig sightings on their phones, 2) use what's called a "Pig Brig," new type of net trap, which can capture up to 70% or more of a sounder at once, 3) promptly transport all pigs away from trapping sites by truck and trailer, 4) educate community on conducting its own sanitary slaughtering practices, and thus 5) the resulting pork can be brought into the Island food system to sustain the program for the future through sales.



FARM-TO-CAR HEALTHY FOOD OPTIONS

Looking for a Great New Way to Access Healthy Produce?

For those who may not know, or may have heard but not yet tried it, Volcano residents can now easily access an innovative new program called "Farm-to-Car" right in Keaau at the Puna Hongwanji Mission.

How it works: Go online to https://shop.hawaiifarmtocar. org/Products/ShowAll to see their amazing selection, place your order any time between 10:00am on Friday and 6:00pm on Monday each week, and then pick up your great ripe veggies and other farm fresh products between 3:00-6:00pm on Wednesdays at their drivethru distribution site. It's like all the convenience of a drivethrough with all the nutrition of eating from your very own garden!

If you are a senior (age 60 and over), through becoming a member of their Kūpuna Market program you will receive a \$40 bi-weekly voucher to purchase local produce, bread, dairy, frozen meat, and non-perishable pantry items. Customers can also use SNAP/EBT and


> DABUX Double-Up Food Bucks, allowing them to maximize budgets while accessing local produce.

This service is the brainchild of Ho'ola Farms, which was originally founded in 2015 as Hoʻōla Veteran Services, with the mission of supporting military veterans and their families entering agriculture. In addition to Farm-to-Car, Hoʻōla Farms runs several other innovative programs to support sustainable food systems on the Big Island. One of these is their Groundwork to Grow training courses, which offers veterans and other Hawaii residents a comprehensive 4-week program to launch them into the agricultural sector (scholarships available). Another great one is their Hilo Food Hub, which is an incubator kitchen for valueadded farm products for producers on the Big Island. It is a commercial kitchen you can rent out by the hour to produce specialty products from your farm's abundance

Volcano School Opens Koa Club After-School Program


Many working parents face a similar challenge: who will watch my child(ren) after school until I get off work? The Volcano School of Arts & Sciences responded to this challenge by launching KOA Club, named after the school's core values: Kūlia, 'Ohana, and Aloha as an enrichment and after school care program for children ages 3 to 13.

Activities include outdoor and indoor games, art, music and drama, free play, and homework help. "I like it," said Cedar Corrao, a second grader. "Especially making Star Wars stuff." His father, Jack Corrao, concurs. "We have three kids at VSAS. Besides Cedar, we've got one in Kindergarten and another in Pre-K. This program is extremely helpful giving our work schedules, and when we pick the kids up, they don't want to leave."

Interested? KOA Club fees are \$240/month for five days per week or \$180/month for three days per week. Children do not have to Volcano School students to attend. Volcano School Gearing Up for Master Build at Keakealani Campus

With infrastructure for the front of the campus now completed, Friends of Volcano School of Arts & Sciences is gearing up to select a construction firm to complete the rest of the campus. The process will begin with a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to be issued Fri-



day, November 24, 2023 followed by Request for Proposals (RFP) issued to selected firms by February 3, 2024. RFQ and RFP information will be posted on friendsofvolcanoschool.org and volcanoschool.net. To receive the RFQ by email or for more information, email friends@volcanoschool.net

"This has been a long time coming," said Volcano School Principal, Kalima Kinney. Government development projects can take quite a long time under normal circumstances. "With delays due to COVID-19 causing supply chain issues and County office shut downs, as well as County permitting challenges including a bumpy roll-out of the County's new EPIC system, the project has taken far longer than we hoped," said Kinney.

"We also had to prioritize adding classroom space by installing a temporary portable classroom building and mobile kitchen," said Kinney. With 350 students and nearly 150 students on the waitlist, the school is bursting at the seams."

Friends of VSAS, the school, and part-

ners, Civil Construction and Engineering Partners, Inc., powered through 43 permits with a number of twists and turns along the way to complete much of the infrastructure needed for the entire campus.

Friends of VSAS will be looking for a firm to handle a design build. The design build process will need to include some modifications to the original design primarily because of County code changes and rising material costs. While the selected firm will handle construction of the rest of the campus, each building will be a separate phase for permitting purposes to enable the school to occupy each building when completed, isolate permitting challenges to individual buildings, and raise the remaining \$5M needed to complete the rest of the campus.

The result was the highly prized 'umeke la'au (wooden bowl). Today, the tradition is carried on by local woodturners who use modern lathes and metal tools. Their skillfull work can be seen in galleries, hotels and museums throughout Hawai'i. Mark Stebbins of the Big Island Woodturners shares his knowledge and examples of 'umeke. 




